NEVERENDING STORY – HELSINKI'S HISTORY

Sweden's King Gustavus Vasa founded Helsinki at the mouth of Vantaanjoki River in **1550** to compete with Tallinn for Baltic Sea trade. The centre of Helsinki was moved to its current location in the 1600s. In **1748** Sweden began construction of the Suomenlinna Maritime Fortress off the coast of Helsinki to counter the growing threat from Russia. Russia conquered Finland in **1809**. The status of Helsinki was raised to capital of the Grand Duchy of Finland in **1812**. A monumental Empire-style city plan was drawn up to reflect the power of Russia and the Tsar.

Finland became independent in **1917**, and Helsinki assumed the demanding new role of capital of the young republic.

Recovering from the hardships of war, Helsinki hosted the Summer Olympics in **1952**.

The games created an international reputation for Helsinki as an efficient and friendly host city. Finland became an EU Member State in **1995**. Helsinki was one of nine European Cities of Culture in **2000**.

HISTORIC CENTRE As early as the 1600s the town square, town hall, a church

and a cemetery were located where the Senate Square can be found today. In 1812 the Russian Tsar proclaimed Helsinki the capital of the autonomous Grand Duchy of Finland and ordered a new monumental city plan to be drawn up in keeping with the city's important new role.

HELSINKI CATHEDRAL AND SENATE SQUARE

Senate Square and its surroundings form a unique and cohesive example of Neoclassical architecture. The square is dominated by four buildings designed by Carl Ludvig Engel between 1822 and 1852: Helsinki Cathedral, the Government Palace, the main building of the University of Helsinki and the National Library of Finland. Helsinki Cathedral is arguably Finland's most famous and photographed building.

HELSINKI CITY HALL AND CITY HALL OUARTER

The City Hall Quarter between the Market Square and Senate Square dates back originally to the 1700s. Architect C. L. Engel updated the buildings in the Empire style to fit in with the Senate Square. Until the early years of the 1900s the City Hall Quarter was the centre of commerce and social life in Helsinki. The City Hall (Pohjoisesplanadi 11-13, see p. 45) was originally built in 1833 as the Hotel Seurahuone but has housed the city government since the 1930s. The Kiseleff House on the corner of Aleksanterinkatu and Unioninkatu sells Finnish handicrafts. Many new shops and restaurants will open in the City Hall Quarter from 2009 onwards.

B HEI SINKI CITY MUSEUM

The main building of the Helsinki City Museum presents the exhibition "Helsinki Horizons", which describes the history of the city over the past 450 years. The Street Museum on Sofiankatu presents street pavements and street fixtures from the late 1700s to the 1930s. The City Museum also shows daily films about Helsinki in Finnish and Swedish, as well as in English during the summer in the Kino Engel cinema.

> The Sederholm House houses exhibitions and is itself the oldest surviving stone building in the city centre, dating back to 1757.

MARKET SQUARE

The Market Square is Helsinki's most cosmopolitan and famous market. The booths here sell traditional market foods and treats, as well as handicrafts and souvenirs. There is also a heated café tent where you can comfortably sip steaming hot coffee even on the coldest days in winter.

6 OLD MARKET HALL

The Old Market Hall alongside the Market Square has been a meeting place for local food lovers and a popular tourist attraction since it first opened in 1889. Under the same roof you can taste traditional delicacies and even try exotic products from Lapland.

PRESIDENTIAL PALACE

The building was originally designed by Pehr Granstedt and completed in 1820, after which C. L. Engel adapted it for use by the Tsar. Since Finland's independence the building has served as the official residence of the President, although today it is used primarily for presidential functions. The official residence of President Tarja Halonen is Mäntyniemi in the Meilahti district, near Seurasaari Island.

USPENSKI CATHEDRAL

Completed in 1868 in the Katajanokka district of Helsinki, the Uspenski Cathedral is the largest orthodox church in Western Europe. With its golden cupolas and redbrick facade, the church is one of the clearest symbols of the Russian impact on Finnish history.

ESPLANADE PARK

Situated in the heart of Helsinki, the Esplanade serves as a promenade for tourists and a place to relax for city residents. The park and the Espa Stage host a wide range of events, especially from May to September.

Designed by Ville Vallgren and built in Paris in 1906, this famous bronze fountain was erected beside the Market Square in 1908. According to Vallgren, the girl's figure symbolises Helsinki and its rebirth.

SUOMENLINNA

Suomenlinna is one of the world's largest historical maritime fortresses. Built on six islands in the 1700s, the garrison town typifies Finland's position between East and West. Suomenlinna is among the most popular sights in Finland and a living district that is home to 850 city residents.





Suomenlinna has been a UNESCO World Heritage Site since 1991. With its museums and events, Suomenlinna offers a unique experience for visitors of all ages, who can also enjoy the islands' enchanting cafes and cosy restaurants. Children can have a great time exploring the many tunnels of the old fortress.

It is good to reserve at least two to four hours for visiting Suomenlinna. The vast fortress is best explored on foot, so prepare for some hiking with good shoes and a windbreaker. Suomenlinna is open year-round, although some facilities are open only in the summer months. Ferries and waterbuses depart for Suomenlinna from the Market Square, the municipal ferry one to three times an hour year round and the JT-Line waterbus twice an hour in summertime. The crossing takes between fifteen to twenty minutes. The municipal ferry accepts regular Helsinki City Transport (HKL) tickets and the Helsinki Card as payment. The JT-Line waterbus, which operates in summertime, is free with the Helsinki Card but does not accept HKL tickets. For more information about tickets, see page 30.

The Visitor Centre on the main island houses Tourist Information and the Suomenlinna Museum, which presents the history of the fortress. Guided tours also depart from here. These are offered daily by the Ehrensvärd Society in the summertime in English, Finnish and Swedish. In wintertime guided tours in English are offered on weekends. Tours can also be ordered in many other languages in advance.

MUSEUMS

Suomenlinna Museum

The Suomenlinna Museum presents the history of the fortress from the 1700s to today. The widescreen multivisual presentation "Suomenlinna Experience" is shown every half-hour in the museum auditorium, taking the audience through the fascinating phases of Suomenlinna's 260-year history.

The centre of Helsinki is packed with things to see and do, and the city never sleeps! Find your own favourite attraction and activity.



1 CENTRAL RAILWAY STATION Considered by many to be the

crowning achievement of legendary architect Eliel Saarinen, Helsinki's Central Railway Station is one of the most impressive examples of Finnish architecture. The granite monument represents the transition from National Romanticism to a new Functionalist style. The station was opened in 1919.

ATENEUM ART MUSEUM

The Ateneum Art Museum is the National Gallery of Finland. The collection features Finnish art from the 1750s to the 1960s and western art from the latter half of the 1800s to the 1950s, including many national treasures. Here you will find Finland's golden age and modern masters, from Albert Edelfelt to Akseli Gallen-Kallela and Helene Schjerfbeck.

Its collections include Finnish and international art – especially Nordic, Baltic and Russian – from the 1960s onwards. Works displayed in the collections and exhibitions include installations, paintings, media art and photography. Kiasma is part of the Finnish National Gallery.

TÖÖLÖNLAHTI BAY

The park around Töölönlahti Bay begins in the heart of Helsinki. A popular walking path circles the bay, which is also a treasure for bird watchers. The wooden villas of the Linnunlaulu ("Birdsong") district are an evocative reminder of Helsinki's building heritage. Finlandia Park on the southern shoreline is being developed between 2006 and 2015 into a new centre for culture and events.



1 FINLANDIA HALL

Overlooking Töölönlahti Bay is the famous concert and meeting hall designed by legendary Finnish architect Alvar Aalto. Guided tours take approximately 30 minutes.

3 OLYMPIC STADIUM

Helsinki's Olympic Stadium has been the arena of emotional sporting and musical events since 1952. The stadium tower is 72 metres high and offers a spectacular view over Helsinki.

The stadium was the result of an architectural competition and has been called the world's most beautiful Olympic stadium. Yrjö Lindegren and Toivo Jäntti won the competition with their aesthetically pure Functionalist design.

4 LINNUNLAULU WOODEN VILLA DISTRICT

Situated on the eastern banks of Töölönlahti Bay, the Linnunlaulu ("Birdsong") district is famous for its ornate wooden villas. Villa Kivi has been renovated into a home for writers. The summer café in the Blue Villa (Sininen Huvila - Linnunlauluntie 11) offers a splendid view over Töölönlahti Bay. Built in 1889, Eläintarhan Huvila (Eläintarhantie 14) is open to the public and features a permanent exhibition of the history of the house and neighbourhood from the late 1800s.

OTHER INTERESTING SIGHTS AND ATTRACTIONS

SEURASAARI

Seurasaari is a popular museum island and recreational area located fifteen minutes by bus from the city centre. The wooden buildings at the Open-Air Museum represent the eastern and western influences of Finnish building traditions from the 18th to the 20th century. Built in 1685, the Karuna Church is one of the most popular venues in Helsinki for summer weddings. During the summer season various workshops and events are organised at the museum presenting traditional handicrafts, customs and folklore. Folk dancing performances are held at the Festival Grounds and the nearby Folklore Centre Tomtebo in summertime.

A walk around the island is a great way to enjoy the beautiful nature and fresh air throughout the year. At the end of June, Helsinki's traditional Midsummer celebrations are held on Seurasaari Island. Family events are also held at Christmastime, Shrovetide and Eastertime.

The area is also home to the 130-yearold **Arabia porcelain factory and museum**, as well as the **littala factory outlet**. Arabia continues to be a pioneer in modern Scandinavian design, combining timeless beauty with everyday practicality.



ARCHITECTURE

In Helsinki you can undertake a fascinating journey through the centuries. The architecture of the city is typified by Nordic modesty and refinement.

The city centre, especially around the Senate Square, is a unique and cohesive example of Neoclassical architec-

ture. The Byzantine-Russian architectural tradition is represented by Alexander M. Gornostajev's Uspenski Cathedral (1868), the largest orthodox church in Western Europe. The city centre features many buildings that typify a specific style of architecture, such as Gustaf Nyström's House of the Estates (1890). The Neo-Renaissance work of Theodor Höijer can be admired along the north side of the Esplanade, as well as in the Ateneum Art Museum (1883).

Art Nouveau or Jugend architecture was interpreted in Finland according to its own form of National Romanticism. Some of the finest examples include Lars Sonck's Jugendsali Hall (1904) and the National Museum (1910) by famous architect trio Gesellius-Lindgren-Saarinen. Late-Jugend is represented by Eliel Saarinen's Central Railway Station (1914). Nordic Classicism of the 1920s is represented by J. S. Siren's Parliament House (1931).

Wooden architecture can be admired in the Käpylä. Puu-Vallila and Etu-Töölö districts. The architec-

> ture of the Käpylä district represents 1920s Classicism. Bold examples of Functionalism include the Olympic Stadium (1940) and the Lasipalatsi "Glass Palace" (1935). The works of world-famous Finnish architect Alvar Aalto represent Modernism at its finest These include the Academic Bookstore (1969) and the Finlandia Hall (1971/1975). One of the most popular tourist destinations in Helsinki is the Temppeliaukio "Rock" Church (1969), designed by Timo and Tuomo Suomalainen as part of the natural bedrock

> The Museum of Contemporary Art Kiasma (1998) designed by American architect Steven Holl represents the best of contemporary architecture. Minimalist glass and steel design is represented by the Sanomatalo (1999) and the High Tech Centre (2001) in Ruoholahti

You can also hop aboard a ferry or waterbus to Suomenlinna Maritime Fortress, and in summertime also to Helsinki Zoo on Korkeasaari Island and the historical town of Porvoo. Many of the **nearby islands** are open for recreational use and can be reached in just minutes by regular ferry services. The islands of **Pihlajasaari** and **Uunisaari** (see page 59) are particular popular places for spending sunny days in the archipelago.

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HELSINKI CARD – EXPERIENCE MORE FOR LESS

Helsinki Card holders are entitled to free, unlimited travel on Helsinki City Transport (HKL), as well as to free admission to over 60 museums and sights. The adult card entitles the holder to a free Audio City Tour (value €25). Other advantages include discounts on Finnair airport buses, restaurants, concerts, bowling, saunas, and much more. In addition, you receive a handy city guide with map.

The Helsinki Card can be purchased from Tourist Information on the Esplanade, at the airport, at passenger ferry terminals, and at the Central Railway Station, as well as from all Helsinki hotels.

The Helsinki Card is valid for 24, 48 or 72 hours, and the time begins when the card is first used. The price for adults is €33 and for children (7-16) starting from €13. Children under 7 are allowed in free to nearly all Helsinki Card attractions.

The city that's easy to get around

Helsinki has excellent public transportation, incorporating trams, buses, metro and the Suomenlinna mu-nicipal ferry. Choose also from a range of convenient ticket options.

The tourist ticket offers unlimited travel for 1, 3 or 5 days on all public transportation within Helsinki. 



BARS AND NIGHTLIFE

Helsinki cannot compete with bigger cities in terms of the amount of nightlife but with the quality and unique nature of what is offered. A wide range of clubs and bars offers something for everyone in terms of clientele, atmosphere and price. Helsinki has a strong DJ-led club culture that has established a deserved foothold in the international scene in recent years. Increasingly the city is also attracting attention for its fashion, music and youth culture.

The trendiest bars and nightclubs favoured by media and cultural personalities can be found in the districts of Kamppi and Punavuori. Large and friendly clubs for everyone can be found in the city centre, while slightly more mature cultural people prefer the scene in the Töölö district. You can experience a particularly exciting atmosphere in the former working-class district of Kallio.

CITY CENTRE

Enjoy your drink high above the city's rooftops in the Ateliee Bar (Sokos Hotel Torni, Yrjönkatu 5). The atmosphere in the exotic Arctic Ice Bar (Yliopistonkatu 5) is always cool. No need to bring your own woollen hat, just ask from the bar! Enjoy the music in the laid-back Vinyl Cocktail Lounge (Yliopistonkatu 8). You can even purchase the record being played for your own collection. Teatteri (Pohjoisesplanadi 2) is an "entertainment complex" that includes a restaurant, bars, a café and a nightclub. Redrum (Vuorikatu 2) offers top-of-the-line sound reproduction and also serves as the venue for Helsinki's number one club Top Billin'. Ópera (Mannerheimintie 6) is a full-blooded rnbhiphop party place. Nolla (Pohjoinen Rautatienkatu 21) hosts popular clubs and a reggae breakfast on Sundays from 11am to 3pm. Rymy-Eetu (Erottajankatu 15-17) offers a relaxed setting. Other popular DJ establishments include **mbar** (Mannerheimintie 22-24) and Mecca (Korkeavuorenkatu 34). The international Grand Casino (Mikonkatu 19) offers high-quality gaming, shows and restaurants.

Tori (Punavuorenkatu 2) is a simple and fun restaurant in the trendy district of Punavuori. Cocktail Lounge A21 (Annankatu 21) offers "fine drinking". Ring the doorbell and step in! Motellet (Annankatu 10) is a café during the davtime and a popular bar in the evening. The Rose Garden (Iso Roobertinkatu 10) offers a wild atmosphere where clubbers can enjoy the heavy base beat and intricate interior. The "hetero-friendly gay restaurant" Lost & Found (Annankatu 6) is a popular place to continue partying in the early hours of the morning throughout the week. The stylish and cool Ahjo (Bulevardi 2-4) is connected to the Klaus K design hotel. Other popular establishments in Punavuori include Café Bar 9 (Uudenmaankatu 9), Belly (Uudenmaankatu 16-20), Erottaja Bar (Erottajankatu 15-17) and We Got Beef (Iso Roobertinkatu 21).



KAMPPI DISTRICT

Overlooking the city, Lux (Kamppi Shopping Centre, Urho Kekkosen katu 1 A) is a top spot for style-conscious night people. Legendary Finnish movie directors Aki and Mika Kaurismäki have their own threerestaurant complex at Eerikinkatu 11, which includes the billiards bar Corona, the tiny Brezhnev-era Moskova Bar, and the nightclub Dubrovnik. Schönes Fräulein (Simonkatu 8) is ideal for laid-back evenings. The legendary artist restaurant Kosmos (Kalevankatu 3) a cultural bar atmosphere, as well as Eastern and Western fusion cuisine. Bar Loose (Fredrikinkatu 34) is the gathering place for Helsinki's garage rockers. Famous artists have been known to throw surprise gigs here. Freda 51 (Fredrikinkatu 51-53) promises fun for younger and older partiers alike. Enjoy some genuine Finnish pop music or join in the karaoke.



KALLIO DISTRICT

Rytmi (Toinen linja 2) is a bar and café next to Hakaniemi Market that is popular among the cultural and media elite. Kuudes linja (Hämeentie 13, entrance from Kaikukatu) has rapidly become one of the most popular live and club music venues in Helsinki. Ravintolalaiva Wäiski (Hakaniemenranta 11) is a restaurant ship that is open year-round, while m/s Svanbad (Pitkänsillanranta 2) is open in summertime. Bar Tokio (Fleminginkatu 13) serves up sushi and music by quest DJs. Other popular establishments include Soul Kitchen (Fleminginkatu 26-28), Kola (Helsinginkatu 13) and Luft (Aleksis Kivenkatu 30).

TÖÖLÖ DISTRICT

The Korjaamo Culture Factory (Töölönkatu 51 B) organises club evenings and a wide range of events. Elite (Eteläinen Hesperiankatu 22) is a legendary restaurant that has served as a "living room" for artists for several decades. Students and other partiers get together at Manala (Dagmarinkatu 2). Storyville (Museokatu 8) is a superb jazz club that is favoured by parliamentarians.



Helsinki's shoreline and archipelago are perfect for enjoying outdoor recreation, swimming and nature walks. The most popular swimming beach is **Hietaniemi Beach**, or "Hietsu" as it is known locally. In addition to the places listed here, public swimming beaches near to the centre can be found at **Seurasaari**, **Mustikkamaa** and **Munkkiniemi**.

Uunisaari Island off the southern shore of Kaivopuisto Park offers sandy beaches and convenient services, attracting holidaymakers to swim and picnic.

How to get there (April-November): Take the small ferry from Merisatamantori (look for the compass), which operates non-stop. (2)

How to get there: Bus 66 A **Kaivopuisto Park** and **Töölönlahti Bay** are ideal places for jogging and walking close to the city centre.

Helsinki also has several preserved manor house parks that are an important part of the city's cultural history. The wide variety of trees and plants combined with the beautiful buildings offer a relaxing setting. 
